The DeMarco Project Speaks; Honoring Military and Veterans who Served

It is my honor to write about Military advocate Mayvee Smith, the daughter of a World War II veteran. Ms. Smith is from an extensive line of military service personnel. Her family's service dates back to World War I, and there are several family

members serving today.

This article focuses on Mayvee honoring her historical military family. The family's military history begins with Ms. Smith's paternal grandmother's brother, Mayvee's Great Uncle Delmar Perkins who was a Buffalo Soldier and served in the 10th Calvary in World War I.

Mayvee's mother had three brothers, and all the brothers served. The eldest brother, Uncle Carney, served in three wars, World War II, Korean War, and Viet Nam and retired as Master Sargent Carney Loveless. Her Uncle Reuben Loveless served in WWII and came out as Private First Class (PFC). The youngest brother, Uncle Sam, served four years in WWII and left the military with the rank of Staff Sargent. Considering the time, it was a phenomenal accomplishment for a Black soldier to achieve that position in the segregated south.

The family military history does not end there. Uncle Carney met his wife Mayvee in Germany, where she served as a librarian in WWII. Ms. Smith had the honor of being named after her uncle's wife. Mayvee's father's sister, her Aunt Gwen Smith, also served in the Army in WWII. Presently, Uncle Carney's grandson Eugene is a Sargent Major in the Army serving in Germany. This family is definitely "ARMY STRONG." Also, her sister's son is a Marine Veteran who served in the Desert Storm War. This family has genuinely shown its love and support for the United States of America.

Of her own accord, Mayvee worked as a civilian in the enlisted and officers club for several years before joining the American Legion Auxiliary (ALA) 7 years ago. The organization has 4 Pillars - Americanism, National Security, Veteran Affairs and Rehabilitation, and Children. Mayvee asked herself, "Where do I fit into the ALA?" She got her answer when a member of the organization asked her to create a program for POW/MIA PFC Francis DeSales Wils, who went missing on February 26, 1966, in South Vietnam, Phu Yen province.

Currently, Mayvee presents several military service-related programs, all done under the ALA, which is the support end of the American Legion and is the largest military support group.

Some of the programs are:

- Mayvee's first program honoredPOW/ MIA PFC Francis DeSales, a Black Veteran, and his family.
- The second program was the first of its kind in the Nation to Honor the first black units and battalions, which included:
- The Buffalo Soldiers: The Buffalo Soldiers came to the event dressed in period costumes and brought period memorabil-
- · The Triple Nickels, who were initially called Smoke Jumpers. The military later changed the name to Paratroopers. Interestingly, The Triple Nickels were part of the Buffalo Soldiers.
- Tuskegee Airman: William Fauntroy, an original documented Tuskegee Airman, who was 92 years old, represented the Airmen.
- Navy Golden 13: Golden 13 Officers initially consisted of 16 Black men. The military decided only to commission the men with degrees and one warrant officer.
- Montfort Point Marines: The Marine Corps was the last branch to integrate in 1942. Three of the original cadets that went through segregated training at Camp Montfort located at Camp Lejeune participated in the program.
- For Active-Duty Personnel: ALA Unit 233 sends military care packages to deployed away from home twice a year. The intent is for the recipients to enjoy "a little piece of home." ALA Unit 233 also hosts an Active-Duty Military Family Baby Shower Supplies Event.
- · For Veterans: Welcome Home Viet Nam Veterans that served are welcomed home and honored.
- Ongoing RED Shirt Friday Remember Everyone Deployed

When asked why she does the work, she responded that she tells people, "This is bigger than Mayvee." She does not see what she does as work. She does what she does to honor, educate, and say thank you. Her mission is to contribute to the healing of the families who have lost their loved ones through their acts of service to this great Nation.

To Mayvee and her family, this writer would like to say what an honor it is to join you in celebrating our military heroes and sheroes.
